




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### Navigating the Convention Center

Session descriptions follow this format: Session Title ROOM/LEVEL • STRAND Session Description Presenters

### **Types of Sessions**

**Breakout sessions** address topics within eight program strands. Presenters are expected to engage participants in interactive learning activities, provide handouts, and respond to post-conference requests for more information.

**Roundtables** offer a more interactive venue for the exploration of key issues within the program strands. Roundtables are scheduled simultaneously in the same room. They are 45 minutes in length and well-suited for exploratory topics and hands-on demonstrations that require small-group interaction and individualized attention to issues under discussion.

**Poster Presentations** are a visual approach to presenting research findings or to describe an activity or program worthy of sharing. The aim is to use the poster as a means for generating active discussion of the project or research. Posters will be displayed on Level 4, near Ballroom D beginning Monday morning, but times will be scheduled when participants can have informal conversations with those presenting the poster. All selected posters will be judged during the conference and prizes will be awarded. A panel of judges will award three levels of awards, but all conference attendees will also vote for a "Best of Show" winner.

### **Program Strands**

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- 1. *Teaching and Learning*. Topics include discipline-specific content areas and teaching strategies for engaging students.
- Developing Faculty. Topics include mentoring/coaching of new faculty, issues facing adjunct faculty, service learning, and tips and tools for becoming a better teacher.
- Student Success. Topics include retention practices, learning communities, student services, access, dual enrollment, and basic skills/developmental education.
- 4. *Culture of Evidence*. Topics include data-informed decision making, assessment, and accountability.

- Educational Technology. Topics include campus cards, distance education, podcasts/vodcasts, mobility devices, and Second Life.
- Diversity. Topics include hiring practices, student services for diverse students, and recruiting students from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.
- 7. Economic and Workforce Development. Topics include entrepreneurialism, developing corporate partnerships, and technical/vocational education.
- 8. Leadership and Organizational Development. Topics include: leadership development institutes, marketing, advocacy, fundraising, communication skills, support staff, and mentoring/ coaching.
